Established in 1963 by Nari Shiksha Samiti in the fond memory of Late (Smt) Kamla Devi Rathi, it was taken over by the State Govt in 1981. Bestowed with the legacy of spreading education it has almost reached the Milestone of 50th Year celebrating its Golden Jubilee in 2013. Starting with merely 13 students in Arts, the college has now enrolled strength of about 1702 students offering an array of U.G. and P.G. programmes ranging from B.A, B.Sc., B.Com, B.Sc.(Home Science) to P.G. in eight subjects viz Political Science, Economics, Geography, Sociology, Psychology and M.Sc. Chemistry, Botany and Zoology. Being located in the tribal and backward class dominated belt, the college is striving hard to cater to the needs of the Students. Rajnandgaon is an important district head quarter of Chhattisgarh State. It is situated on the National Highway NH6 & Howrah Mumbai Rail Line. The nearest airport is Raipur, about 78 km away from the venue. The college is about 2 km from the bus stand and 5 km from the railway station.

Women Empowerment and Nari Shiksha being high on the agenda, the Institution offers ample opportunities to create and nurture an environment that kindles learning and inspires to build a career and personality through participation in NSS, NCC, Co-Curricular and extracurricular-activities. The college has adequate infrastructure to achieve its goal. #### **Executive Summary- The SWOC Analysis of the Institution**

The genesis of Govt. Kamla Devi Rathi Mahila Mahavidyalaya could be traced back to the vision of its founding fathers and the holy zeal of the people of Rajnandgaon to bring this vision to fruition. This was the vision of harnessing the potentiality of young women making them knowledgeable, confident and independent, enabling them to synchronize our traditional cultural values and new scientific approach, thereby empowering them to march forward in life. Being located in the tribal and backward class dominated belt, the college is striving hard to provide equal opportunity and free quality education to the deprived class of society SC, ST, OBC, Minority and below poverty line girl students of Rajnandgaon Distt, some of which are first generation learners. Established in 1963 by Nari Shiksha Samiti in the fond memory of Smt. Kamla Devi Rathi, it was taken over by the State Govt in 1981. Bestowed with the legacy of spreading education it has almost reached the Milestone of 50th Year celebrating its Golden Jubilee in 2013. Starting with merely 23students in Arts, the college has now enrolled strength of about 1702 students offering an array of U.G. and P.G. programmes ranging from B.A, B.Sc., B.Com, B.Sc.(Home Science) to P.G. in eight subjects viz. Political Science, Economics, Geography, Sociology, Psychology and M.Sc. Chemistry, Botany and Zoology. Women Empowerment and Nari Shiksha being high on the agenda, the Institution offers ample opportunities to create and nurture an environment that kindles learning and inspires to build a career and personality along with the unified development of body, mind and heart. With such ideals not only was this college born but it also bequeathed the legacy of a great inheritance to posterity.

#### **Criteria - I: Curricular Aspects**

For the realization of its vision of emancipation and empowerment of woman through value based holistic higher education, college offers an array of courses 5 UG Courses and 8 PGs. We are having all the four streams viz. Science, Commerce, Home Science and Arts for the all-round development of the students. At UG level we are running B.A., B.Sc., B.Sc. (Home Science), B.Com. Ten combinations are running in B.A. with the subjects Sanskrit, Sociology, Psychology, Economics, Geography, English, Hindi, Home-Science, Political Science and Music. At PG level, we have M.Sc. (Chemistry), M.Sc. (Botany), M.Sc. (Zoology) and M.A. in Psychology, Political Science, Sociology, Economics and Geography. Institution also offers self finance course in B.Sc.(Microbiology). Cooking Baking, Food Preservation and Mehandi art classes have been conducted for the students and people in the vicinity of the college to increase the employment possibilities. Being an affiliated college we don't have our board of studies, but faculties of college are Chairman and members of board of studies of Pdt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur and Central Board of Studies of Higher education department and actively contributing in the curriculum development. The University makes the provision for semester examinations for post graduate classes, annual examination for undergraduate classes for theory & practical examination & also evaluation of the answer sheets & declaration of the results. Programmes to instill moral and ethical values are also organized by the college from time to time. Feedback from students and stake holders is taken regularly. Some skill development programmes and enrichment are organized by the Career guidance cell, such as tailoring, beautician, cooking, soft toy making

and personality development programmes. Talks and lectures of eminent speakers are a regular feature of the institution to train and create awareness amongst students. NCC and NSS also organize programmes on cross cutting issues like " Save girl child", "Human rights", Protection of Environment", "Voter Awareness", "Ban the use of Polythene ", etc. Institution also organized educational tour to give students relevant exposure.

There is Parent- Guardian Interactions for the students' support and help. We are constantly doing our efforts to convert our motto into action plans by providing excellent educational infrastructure, promoting all round development of girls mentally, physically simultaneously preserving their moral and cultural values. Besides classroom teaching different departments arrange different activities as per need of curriculum such as talks and discussions, invited lectures of renowned speakers, group discussions, seminars and workshops etc. Many faculty members are a part of professional research bodies and research journals and many are provided with financial assistance in doing research projects. Short term learning programmes for skill development, preparation of competitive examinations. are also organized regularly in the College. The outstanding achievements and contributions of staff members are recognized and honored at the state and national level.

#### **Criteria - II: Teaching - Learning and Evaluation**

The Institution reaching its 53 Milestone of academic journey has evolved an evaluation pattern with higher weightage to formative evaluation and is therefore conducive to the formation of higher level of cognitive skill. The most valuable and powerful aspect of any institution is Teaching and Learning and the college maintains a student-centric and learnercentric atmosphere to achieve the desired outcome. The college also ensures complete transparency in the admission process through well administered mechanism complying with all the norms of the Deptt. of Higher Education C.G. The students are selected on merit cum first- serve basis depending upon the number of seats available for various courses. Reservation policy of Government for admission process is strictly followed. . Students are provided counseling at time of admission and are helped to choose the programmes / courses programmatically by looking at their strength. Providing learning centric environment in the college, we have Wi-Fi campus and computer facility for students. For internal evaluation seminar, CCE, quiz programmes etc are conducted. Differently abled students are given special facilities in the college. The college plans and organizes its teaching learning and evaluation schedule in compliance with the annual academic calendar and teaching plan. Learning is conducted by an amalgamation of traditional methods of chalk and talk and the use of I.C.T .Lectures by various subjects experts are also organized to enrich the knowledge and expose the students to latest advancements in their. Remedial classes are arranged to help the slow learners to adapt to the rigorous teaching learning process. SC/ST/OBC, minority and economically backward students are given remedial coaching during improvement period .Teacher- Guardian scheme s also followed and well implemented. The teachers are well qualified and trained. We run extra classes as an aid for weaker students. The college has adequate inbuilt mechanism which is continually updated to achieve the goals of academic excellence

#### Criteria - III: Research, Consultancy and Extension

Our college is a UG college and not a research centre of Pdt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur, but our faculty members are actively involved in research. In last 04 years 08

research projects were sanctioned by UGC in department of Psychology, Geography, Economics, Sociology, Sanskrit, English, Mathematics and Sports were successfully completed. Our faculties have published research papers in Journals at national and international level and presented their research work in conferences/ seminars at nation and international level. To facilitate exchange of research know how, the institution has research linkages. Researchers of eminence from various disciplines are invited by different departments of the institution for interaction with teachers. Departments of Home-science and Psychology support consultancy services for the upliftment of socio-economically deprived sections of society. Social lacunae and community based needs are kept in view while taking decision on organizing and implementing consultancy services. Faculty of Psychology Department runs 'Counceling Center' and also provides district level Consultancy and Counselling to police Mahila Prakosht and Mahila Avam Bal Vakas for family disputes since last 4 years. State Govt. of Chhattisgarh has recognized the Institution as a counceling center for 'Vivah Purva Paramarsh Kendra' under Central Govt. Scheme. Our college is a participating and consultancy agency to develop village Khamhera of Rajnandgaon Distt, as UBA (Unnatt Bharat Abhiyan) Village in 'Chalo Gaon Ki Ore' scheme. Blood donation camps, sickle cell testing camps are regularly conducted by the college. Various awareness campaigns such as Aids awareness and its allied diseases, environmental protection programmes. The college has a wide range of extension and outreach programmes with special focus on the underprivileged and vulnerable section of thesociety. The institution promotes the participation of students and faculty in extension activities through NSS and NCC units. To make the campus eco friendly, rain water harvesting and plantation programmes are conducted. The students are encouraged to participate in these activities and students with excellence are awarded prize at the college on annual prize distribution function.

#### **Criteria - IV: Infrastructure and Learning Resources**

The institution ensures optimal allocation and utilization of the available financial; resources for maintenance and upkeep of the facilities. We have well equipped laboratories, Wi-Fi campus. The library provides open access journals and book facilities. There is a well equipped library with internet connectivity and a Research Zone. The College has a Wi Fi enabled Campus and ten functional Computers with Wi Fi connectivity. There is no staff appointed for maintenance and repair by the government. Most of the maintainance is done by P.W.D. The repairing, maintenance and servicing of equipments is done on the basis of annual maintenance contract on call basis. Our institution has 12 classrooms 1 seminar hall, 1 multipurpose hall, and 6 well equipped laboratories. College has its own botanical garden with 81 medicinal plants. It encourages students to identify their surrounding plants and they encouraged to know the hidden medicinal properties of medicinal plants. Institution has badminton court, Table-Tennis court, Basket Ball ground, Cricket Pitch, Gymnasium and a Sports Multipurpose Hall for indoor games such as carom, chess, Judo Karate and Archery. Special health check up camp is regularly organized by NSS unit each year. CCTV cameras are fixed on all the important points on the college campus for the security of the girls. The college has a campus of 12.79 acres. The outsiders and students both have access to the college website for regular updates and information. We even have four voting booths of ECI in the premises.

#### **Criteria - V: Student Support and Progression**

Our college is committed to provide full support to the students for their holistic development. The college organizes sports, games, cultural and extracurricular activities for the students. The college has organized several state level competitions in sports. The college has a career guidance cell and English language lab.For Health support college is in very close proximity to three main hospitals and a 24 hour government ambulance service no. 108 is availableWe identify slow learners and provide them special coaching. We have different cells in which students participate and get career guidance. The results of UG and PG classes of our college are very good and due to efforts of our faculties pass % is continuously increasing. In sports also students have received awards at university and state level. We organize Yoga camp, health check-up camp, Archery training and Judo - Karate camp for students. This college provides Scholarship to SC, ST, and OBC Students in accordance with the government provision made for this purpose. Different prizes and awards are given to the talented students to recognise their achievements and give encouragement to them through the innovative practice of the institution- Medals by Daandatas. Student council was formed in the years 2009-10, 2010-11 but as per the decision taken by the state government there was no student council for session 2011-12, 2012-13 and 2013-14. However in 2014-15 and 2015-16, Student Union was elected as per the Ordinance of the University. The college caters and welcomes diversity in its learning community. Admission seats are reserved for SC/ST students according to Govt. rules. The college has a Redressal cell and anti-ragging committee. The career guidance cell provides training programmes related to entrepreneurial skills to students. For weak students institution organises tutorial classes, remedial classes and extra coaching classes. We run extra classes as an aid for weaker students as well. The system of internal assessment through CCE is transparent. .

#### Criteria - VI: Governance, Leadership and Management

Our college provides education to girls coming from marginalised and weaker section of the society. Our objective is to transform young women to intellectually competent, emotionally balanced, morally upright and professionally skilled person. We are also continuously improving teaching learning process, research and community activities. College aims to provide an amiable environment to the students which fosters mutual respect between students, teachers, parents and administrators. The financial resources of the College are managed in a very effective and foolproof manner. Internal audit is done by a team of senior Professors constituted by the Principal. An audit of UGC, autonomous grant is conducted by a C.A. External Audit is done by the State government agencies. Institution has A/F, Jan Bhagidari Fund, UGC fund which is utilised for sports, library, infrastructure, affiliation fees, and payment of guest faculty. Three types of accounts are there- P.D Account, Government Account and Janbhagidaari Account. We have very active IQAC, which monitors and assures quality of education. The IQAC plans for the maintenance and sustainaince of quality in education, empowerment of the faculties and development of the spirit of research and scientic temper in the institution. NSS Motto is "Not me but you" reflects the essence of democratic living & upholds the need for selfless service. NCC is playing a commendable role in transforming the youth to become responsible & motivated citizen. Two of our NCC cadets had participated in TSC Camp.

The college is governed by C.G.P Higher education Department. The Directorate of College Education. The Principal provides academic leadership and in association with the various faculties, evolves strategies for academic growth. Principal and Faculty work in conjunction

to formulate and implement its policy and plans for assurance of quality in higher education. In the leadership of the principal a well-knit system of governance is operational in the institute where authority and responsibility is delegated to staff thus while discharging their duties every member of the staff gets ample opportunity to develop quality of leadership. Post Graduate departments of the College are recognised by Pdt. Ravi Shankar Shukla University, Raipur. The Our institution has 30 post. Vacant posts are filled on contractual basis according to the govt. norms. College administration encourages the faculty to participate in international seminars, workshops and conferences. The College has established the IQAC for accreditation quality assurance. The institute has a well defined perspective plan for the development of 21 crores submitted to RUSA.

#### **Criteria - VII: Innovation and Best Practices**

Our college is having many innovative schemes and following various best practices. We have created awareness regarding energy conservation, use of renewable energy, water harvesting, carbon neutrality etc. Our 02 best practices are:

- Best of Waste
- Shairing of Sports Infrastrucrural Facilities

As per our committment to environmental preservation, the process of plantation of shady trees in our new campus has already begun. The college is strictly declared as a No Polythene Zone. No Petrol Day is observed. For the proper conduction of the administrative jobs, 45 committees have been formed in the college. Medals are given by Donors in memory of their beloved ones. We are striving hard to make our campus eco-friendly. We have water harvesting system & a Botanical garden in which medicinal plants are being cultivated. Our college has introduced some innovative practices during the last four years such as ID card. Institution has published its own magazine, Self Defence Programme- Judo Karate training. To achieve the institutional objectives we have introduced Best of Waste and Sharing of Sports Facility as the best practices which reflects the institutes constant quest for excellence which is facilitated by the vision and active role played by IQAC.

#### **B. WEAKNESESS:**

- The college has to conduct exams and classes simultaneously which disturbs its routine.
- Lack of permanent teaching and supportive staff.
- Laboratory space is not sufficient.
- Research facilities are not up-to the mark.
- Infrastructure in proportion to the number of enrollments.
- Computer facility is not in proportion to the number of enrollments.
- Placement problems.
- Lack of Vocational, Add on, certificate and computer programmes.
- Poor student- teacher ratio for compulsory subjects like Hindi and English.
- All courses offered do not ensure employability.
- Less competition owing to rural background of students.

- Financial constraints: Many improvements could not be carried out due to paucity of funds.
- Library needs to be computerized.

#### C. OPPORTUNITIES:

- Scholarship Funding for education enhancement.
- Increasing awareness towards women education.
- Career guidance to all.
- Personality development and mentoring.
- Opening Inter -disciplinary courses and Inter -disciplinary research.
- Start subjects/courses to make girl students self sufficient e.g. Fashion Designing, Dietetics, Food Processing, Mushroom culture, Computer Application, etc. It can increase the GER of the college.
- Quality and infrastructure can be further improved with assurance of monetary grant from RUSA.
- Approval, sanction and posting for hostel setup by the government will facilitate more girls from rural area to study.

- Challenge of technical and vocational training courses, it is necessary to establish the need and importance of the various traditional courses.
- The college sees it as a challenge and aims to tackle it.
- Though the College has Wi-Fi Facility, it aims to increase ICT facilities according to the growing demand of the time.
- As students are the real wealth of the college, the institution also wants to keep creating employable youth.
- Students belong to the orthodox families, (Early marriage and other conservative views of the families) create difficulty in imparting scientific knowledge which is another challenge that faculty faces.
- Commuting time between their home and college is more since they come from far places and transport facility is not there.

- For good placement grooming the students and upgrading the communication skill. Limitation and constraint in government financial support.
- Access to computer & Internet in proportion to the number of students.
- Poor employment ratio and Infrastructural facilities in proportion to the number of students.
- Competition from other colleges in the vicinity. Private colleges offering large variety of courses in flexible ways.
- Lack of industry institution partnership.



The undergraduate program of the college offers Economics, Hindi Literature, English Literature, Sociology, Political Science, Home Science, Geography, Psychology, Music and Sanskrit as core subjects in the Humanities stream. In the Science Stream the core subject offered is Chemistry with a choice between Mathematics, Physics or Chemistry/ Botany, Zoology and Micro-Biology. Proceeding on to Post graduate studies, the students can acquire a Master's degree in Economics, Political Science, Sociology, Psychology and Geography in Arts faculty and the Science graduate can go for Master's degree in Chemistry, Botany and Zoology.

College offers regular degree course of B.Sc., B.A., B.H.Sc. and Commerce & 8 P.G. Courses in Arts and Science. At the time of admission candidate can elect / opt or change their subjects / faculty according to their choice.

**Arts** - Institution has prepared 6 groups of different subject. According to choice of the candidates three compulsory subjects are selected whereas Foundation course is mandatory.

Science – Faculty provides three degree courses

- · B.Sc. Biology Zoology, Botany, Chemistry (ZBC)
- $\cdot$  B.Sc. Math Physics, Chemistry, Math (PCM)
- · B.Sc. Micro Biology Micro Biology, Botany, Chemistry (MBC)

Subjects are selected by students' choice. Foundation course is mandatory.

**Home Science** -Faculty offers B.H.Sc. degree course where all the subjects are compulsory which is approved by central board of studies, Raipur including foundation course.

**Commerce** –Faculty offers: B.Com- All compulsory subjects.

Personality development programmes make the students street smart. Imagination and creativity are developed, writing and speaking skills along with self-confidence is improved with various co-curricular & extracurricular activities. The examination pattern for U.G. is Annual and for P.G. it is Semester system.

## **1.2.4** Does the institution offer self-financed programmes? If 'yes', list them and indicate how they differ from other programmes, with reference to admission, curriculum, fee structure, teacher qualification, salary etc.

- Yes, the college offers self-financed programmes at UG level.

**Teacher Qualifications**: The teachers are recruited through advertisement in all the leading news papers every year, the State Govt. procedure along with UGC norms are the basis of selection. Janbhagidari Samiti is responsible for all the recruitments.

**Salary**: Janbhagidari Samiti of the college can appoint & pay temporary teaching staff through its available and generated funds. It even decides the salary components of the teachers who specifically teach in self-finance course. The Principal who is the Secretary of the Samiti, constitutes the selection committee, with the instruction of Samiti. Selection is done on merit basis according to the State Government Rules & U.G.C Norms. Payment to faculty and staff is made from the fund of Samiti.

## **1.2.5** Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If 'yes' provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes, college provides additional skill oriented programme relevant to regional & global employment market through Career Guidance cell. It organizes various skill-oriented programmes such as Personality Development and English Language Workshop. The college takes special efforts to enhance and improve its scholars' personality by arranging workshops on communication skills and other aspects of personality development. Career Cell invites resource persons of various subjects to give information on the career options and growing demands of the industry, which helps them prepare for employability. This cell regularly arranges certain skill development, Handicrafts, Cooking and Food Preservation.

Academic programmes follow the academic calendar of Deptt. of higher education, Govt. of C.G. strictly. Institution gives special emphasis on the overall development of students for becoming good citizens by giving them exposures related to the subjects opted. Various clubs like Book reading club, Debate club, Educative writing club have the goal to develop the communication-skills, verbal and written, creativity, imagination and self confidence. Along with it the women do realize their aesthetic sense and intellect by involving them in the club activities. Special courses like Spoken English, Personality Development, Beautician, Handicrafts, Cooking and Food Preservation are practiced to develop the skill-based competencies in women for their economic independence. Remedial classes are organized too by the institution to prepare them for current competitive market.

- Give exposure by Field/Study/Excursion tours.

- College also organized seminar on "Women Empowerment".

The holistic development of students is ensured by various enrichment programs. The college is aware of the importance of value-added teaching-learning environment particularly in present scenario, when the deterioration in values and morality has led to increase in crimes and is posing a major threat to society. The objective of all academic programmes of the college is to groom students in such a manner that they become morally strong and socially responsible citizens. Several efforts have been made to inculcate:

#### Moral and ethical values:

The courses of subjects like English, Hindi, Sanskrit, Political Science and Sociology impart value education, feeling of nationalism and patriotism among students. Cultural education is imparted by making students sensitive to our value system, traditions and culture through the life and achievement of our great men. Writers like Mahatma Gandhi, S. Radhakrishnan, Sarojini Naidu, Jawaharlal Nehru, Thoreau and Emerson are part of syllabus. While preparing the students for the challenges on the professional front, good care is taken that they never lose sight of moral values, professional ethics and the cultural values of the land. Efforts are made for holistic development of students through Wall magazines, Jan Chetna Rallies, Character Building Camps, Lectures Seminars, Workshops on Personality Development and other numerous Extension Activities etc. Besides these, the cross cutting issues such as gender, climate change, environment education, human rights, ICT are integrated into the syllabus in number of subjects.

#### **Environment Education:**

Environment education has been introduced as an independent but compulsory subject in B.A./B.Sc./B.Com/B.H.Sc hence the students are trained in the field of environment protection. There is an environment committee in the college which organizes various competitions related to environmental issues and invites environment experts to deliver lectures on environment.

#### **Gender Issues:**

The gender issues are covered in some social sciences subjects like Sociology, Political Science and Psychology. The curriculum of English and Hindi courses comprises of many topics related to issues like feminist studies, gender, climate change, environment education, human rights etc. In psychology, various women related topics are in curriculum like prejudices, gender discrimination, stereotype interpersonal attraction etc. The gender issues are given a platform for discussion, analysis and resolution through the seminars and workshop organized by the institution on regular basis. The college has

organized National Seminar on "Women Empowerment and Sports" in which Mrs. Deepa Malik (Arjun Awardee) delivered a motivational speech.

### Employable & Life Skills

- Career cell regularly organizes visit of eminent resource person who interacts students with various career options.
- Special sessions of verbal & written communication skills are also organized which emphasize on the methods of effective communication.
- Life skills are improved with sessions with group discussions, essay writing, slogan writing, recitation of poetry etc. To improve students' team building spirit & group behavior they are initiated to participate in culture activities, 'Yuva Utsav', conferences, Seminars & workshop.
- Yoga, Pranayam, Judo, karate classes are the regular features of the institution to develop employable and life skills.

### **Better Career Options**

Career cell organizes visits of eminent resource person in order to give exposure to students for better career options. Regular training programmes are also organized.

**Community Orientation** –National Service Scheme & NCC unit organizes programmes such as blood donation camp, tree plantation, adoption of a village/ school/ slum to leave a positive mark on community. NSS Unit organizes special ten days residential camp in village. Through these camps villagers are oriented & provided awareness on various social, moral & life skills. Preparations of nutritious low cost recipes are demonstrated. Awareness sessions on Personal hygiene, prevention from deadly disease like cancer, adverse effects of Tobacco chewing & alcohol consumption is also arranged time to time.

- The IQAC has feedback forms as provided by NAAC on various topics, which are filled by the students on various topics.
- The institution has various channels to collect and document responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The students express their opinion on curriculum through oral responses. The feedback thus obtained is communicated to the University for appropriate action through the faculty members who are part of the Board of Studies & Board of Examiners in the particular faculty in the University.

Oral feedback is also taken from the students by the head of the institution and accordingly desired action is taken. The information collected through the feedbacks is considered and remedial measures are taken and efforts made to solve the problems by the head of the institution.

### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

The institution ensures wide publicity to the admission process through:

- The same information in also available on the college website.
- Admission notices are displayed on notice board of the college.
- Brochure is provided with application form. The detailed information about number and range of courses seats available, eligibility, fee structure, faculty details etc are given in brochure.
- The Students are expected to apply till a given date.
- The application forms along with certificates are verified by the admission committees
- The merit cum admission list is displayed on the notice board of the college.
- Transparency is ensured from the stage of form submission, notification till the completion of admission process.

# 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. Admissions are done on merit basis. Names of the selected students from the ones applied for admission are displayed on the notice board. Students are asked to pay their fees in the allotted time. The admissions are given on the basis of first come first served basis. No entrance tests or interviews are organized for entrance.

## 2.1.3 Give the minimum and maximum percentage of marks for admission at entry level for each of the programmes offered by the college and provide a comparison with other colleges of the affiliating university within the city/district.

There is certain minimum cut-off percentage to get admission in the college e.g. U.G. classes 50% and P.G. classes 55% is decided respectively. But this college being the one and only Govt. Girls College in the District offering free education programmes in all the four streams viz. Arts, Science, Commerce and Pure Home Science and at U.G. Level and P.G. in 8 subjects and most of the girls applying for admission are from backward and economically deprived sections of society, so it becomes imperitive for

the institution to give admission to the maximum girls as per the instructions and policy of state government. In the academic session of 2015-16, the minimum and maximum percentage of different classes is as follows-

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### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

### 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

- The college makes best possible efforts to address to the needs of differently-abled students.
- These students are allotted time-table in such a manner that their classes are held on the ground and first floor.
- The college strictly adheres to the reservation policy laid down by the government to provide access to students from the differently-abled /challenged sections of the society.
- In undergraduate and postgraduate seats are allocated to the differently- abled candidates.
- Fee concessions, government scholarships, various scholarships by the social welfare department and other grants are also made available to these students.
- Besides the government policies, extra efforts are taken by the institution to make them comfortable and stay motivated.

### 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

The college is a State Government institute and as such holds no admission test. It follows the admission policy of the state Government however the college conducted zero classes in the beginning of the session for the first & second semester students. They were guided for better performance rectifying trivial mistakes.

Knowledge and skills is imparted to all students equally without any discrimination. In order to satisfy their quarries the collage ensures that there are teachers available to answer their doubts. We have a large number of students from various backgrounds and different parts of the district.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Following strategies are adopted for the development of creative & motivational environment\_ Orientation programme – Special orientation programmes for

different faculties i.e. science, arts, home science & commerce are organized. These programmes emphasize on Vision, mission and objectives of the institution, knowledge about departments of college and general discipline, eligibility for scholarships, functions, extra and co-curricular activities like Yuva utsav, Sports, NSS, NCC, enrichment courses by the career cell, etc.

- Each department also orient students about the curriculum, examination pattern, CCE, practical etc.
- Remedial classes, extra care, extra efforts encouragement & motivating the students facing learning difficulties /slow learners by their subject teachers.
- Personal guidance by the faculty all the time helps the students to overcome their problems.
- Tutorials, counseling, bridge & remedial classes are the extra measures which are taken for the improvement of enrolled students.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- In the year 2013, UGC sponsored two day seminar was organized by the department of Geography on the theme of—Global Warming: Crisis Confronting Human Survival. A good number of scholars, teachers and research students from across the country participated in the seminar and their deliberations on environmental issues were very beneficial.
- Moreover, in response to the need for the conservation of water, the college has made provisions for Rain water harvesting. There is also an ongoing plan of harnessing solar energy.
- Experts from various Departments are invited from time to time for lectures and discussions on gender issues, environmental hazards and other current problems.
- To address the gender issues a 2 days National Seminar was organized on Women Empowerment and Sports in which Mrs. Deepa Malik (Arjun Awardee Fame), a paraplegic sports woman gave a very touching and impressive motivational speech

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The institution identifies advanced learners through daily classroom interaction, direct interaction; examinations (unit tests, quarterly and half-yearly and annual exams, competitive skill based tests etc.) seminar presentation enables the teachers to identify the advance learners. Different extra- curricular activities like quiz, debate, speech etc., are also helpful in identifying the good students. Special care has also been taken in different classes in UG level to sort out the students with special ability. Results of previous years of the students are analysed. The institution responds to their special educational/learning needs by taking following measures:

- Self-financing course B.Sc. (Micro-Biology) is available in the institute.
- Need based support is given to the students.
- Students are made aware, motivated and guided about various learning options available to them.
- Guest and expert lectures are arranged to facilitate advanced learner.

- Counseling is given on personal, educational and professional level.
- Special books of more advanced level are recommended to them.
- Liberal facilities are allowed to advanced learners. They can borrow any number of books.
- Special coaching classes are organised to remove their doubts and difficulties.
- Advanced learners are given exclusive guidance to pursue their interests in fields like research, UPSC, State PSC, NET, SET and various competitive exams. However, our faculties are available beyond the classroom hours for guiding advanced learners.
- Some facilities for differently-abled students like providing writer and extra time during examination is available.
- Career counseling/ Personality development/English coaching classes are run by the college.
- Every year best student award and many other talent encouragement awards are given at the college level.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?

Academic performance: - On Completion of every month, attendance registers daily diaries are supervised monthly by the principal. Though the committee (IQAC) is responsible for collection of the data to monitor the same.

**Slow learners:** - Slow learners are identified through oral response and written tests. Extra classes are held to repeat the difficult topics of their syllabus and study material is provided by teachers for better understanding of subject. They are motivated to use library facilities to the fullest, participate in class seminars etc.

**Economically weaker section:** - Economically weaker sections is given financial assistance by the government under various welfare schemes so that finance does not become a hindrance to their study.

### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

### 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organise the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Higher education Deptt. Govt. of C.G. along withpPdt.Ravishankar Shukla University prepares an Academic Calendar, which is strictly followed by the institution. (Enclosed)

• According to the calendar, teachers prepare their teaching plan, which is monitored regularly by the Principal.

- Daily Diary is filled by all the teachers which is counter signed every month by the Principal. It is assured that the course is complected according to the schedule.
- The evaluation blue print is prepared by various types of CCE as per the programme. The classroom additives like quiz, group discussion also added to the evaluation process.
- Daily attendance is taken in attendance register by all teachers.
- Assignments, projects, semi-surprise tests are conducted for students.

### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

IQAC cell of the institution takes following actions to improve teaching learning process-

1. Department having post-graduate classes have their separate departmental library.

2. Faculty in-charge and Heads of Department of the institution organize regular meetings with the junior faculty member to guide them for improving their teachings as well as solving their problems regarding their teaching practices.

3. Principal and members of the IQAC cells give knowledge to the junior faculty members time to time regarding latest techniques used in teaching.

4. To evaluate the knowledge of students we organize seminars in Post – graduate classes. It helps them to gain knowledge of the subject as well as it boosts their confidence.

5. We organize guest lectures from the renowned professors of the various colleges and universities.

6. To raise the interest of students in subjects we organize many educational tours to different places.

7. Teachers use audio-visual aid for their teaching more effective.

8. We encourage students to participate in Research seminars and conference to initiate their interest in research field.

9. Teachers regularly maintain their attendance registers and diaries which are duly signed by the Principal at the end of every week to monitor the teachings of faculty members.

For monitoring the Teaching learning quality IQAC cell of institution is taking following steps-

1. Self evaluation Performa is being filled by the faculty members.

2. Principal regularly monitors the implementation of the time-table.

3. Cell members make surprise visit to the class and ask questions related to the subject also check their class note-books.

## 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures ad systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The institution ensures that its learning be made more student centric through seminars, unit tests , group discussions internal assessments, elocution, debates, poster presentations, study tours, sports, N.C.C. and N.S.S. activities etc, that are scheduled annually as per the university calendar. The teachers incorporate inter active learning by holding class seminars and group activities. The collaborative learning is conducted by inter disciplinary exchange programmes and lectures by various subject experts. The independent learning is ensured by encouraging the students to get involved in research practices, making use of books, reference books, journals, use of internet etc.

### **2.3.4** How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- An interdisciplinary approach is encouraged among students through seminars and discussions with subject experts.
- Leadership skill and management skill of the students are encouraged through works like volunteering for various cultural and academic programmes.
- Project work, writing dissertations area part of curricula for PG programmes.
- To enhance the critical thinking among students, group discussion, essay competitions, debates etc are held in the institution.
- Last semester students of PG classes have to prepare internal assessment which are evaluated on the basis of the reports, they present.
- The college organizes various special days like world environment day, NSS day, NCC day, International women's day, Hindi divas etc. Vivekanand jayanti, Independence day, Republic day, Gandhi jaynati, Teacher's day. C.G.. Sthapana Diwas (01 November), Science day (28 Feb.) Good Governance day etc and also celebrates and organizes various activities.
- They are also encouraged to participate in essay writing, poetry writing, quiz, general knowledge competition to develop competitive skill and aptitude.
- College's NSS unit, NCC unit, Red Ribbon club, Literacy committee organize various competitions such as debate, essay, slogan, group discussions and posters competitions on various national and international issues.
- 28 competitions were organized for students by Yuva Utsav Committee in collaboration with the Home Science Department.
- Students are rewarded with the certificates and prizes at the time of annual function.

# 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? effective teaching. Students are encouraged to prepare visual-aids like charts, models, posters, and puppets etc. as supportive measures for the presentations. Students are encouraged to use & collect material/data through Internet.

The College has been organizing seminars and workshops for all faculty members. The College faculty visit other institutions for participating in Refresher courses, Sam workshops, and other workshops organized by university and academic staff college.

Apart from chalk and talk method, the faculties use the method of teaching like use of OHP, LCD etc. for giving lecture on various topics. Extra study material and lectures in the form of CDs, translations, study material from internet etc are supplied to the students. Help of audio visual aids, interactive methods like seminars, group discussions are used by the faculty to ensure student centric learning. By Participating in all these,

the faculty not only enrich their subject knowledge but also get exposed to new methods of teaching by which they can guide the students better.

### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

The library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process in the manner below:

- The college library has subscribed to various journals related to different subjects.
- Wi-Fi and internet facility is available in the central library. It is being frequently used by the students.
- Books and magazines are purchased by the college on regular basis for knowledge up gradation. .
- News papers and internet are used on daily basis to keep track of the latest advancements in a particular field.
- A new furnished reading room.
- A separate periodical section has been created in the library.
- Book bank has been functioning in the college, providing books to SC/ST students.
- There is a corner in the library reserved exclusively for differently-abled students.
- Study material in Braille is being made available to visually challenged students.
- Library has research scholar desk.
- Special help is rendered to students preparing for competitions.
- Old question papers of final exams in all the subjects are being made available to the students.
- Copies of syllabi prescribed by the university and college, with question-wise division of marks etc. are also made available to students for ready reference.
- The library staffs keeps the faculty and the students updated regarding its latest acquisitions.
- Besides this, each post graduate department is having its own departmental library with adequate number of books for Postgraduate and research students.
- The central library is open from 10:30 AM to 5 PM on all working days.

- Resource persons are invited for special lectures to re-orient the teachers to new teaching methods and update them in their subject.
- Students' attendance register and daily dairy are also maintained by teachers.
- Teachers' attendance register maintained by principal.

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- Permanent faculties are recruited by the state government through PSC and other Govt. policies- adhoc regularization, emergencies appointment etc.

- Applications are invited by advertising in news papers for the appointment of guest faculty. Now this process of selection is done online.
- As per Govt. norms a merit list of eligible candidates is generated and displayed on the website of department of higher education for inviting them as guest faculty in the colleges. Thus transparency is ensured for the selection.
- The institute makes its best efforts to recruit and retain qualified and competent teachers.

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

To ensure that the stakeholders and students are aware of the evaluation processes; the institution takes the following measures:

- The evaluation methods are communicated through the Prospectus, college website Notice Board, even though announcements in the class rooms.
- In the beginning of the session, college level and departmental level orientation programs are conducted in which all information related to exams and evaluation is narrated to the students.
- The progress of the students is monitored by the teachers through class tests, written assignments, oral tests, group discussions, interactive sessions, Half-yearly and finally through the term-end examinations.

### 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

Evaluation is done on the basis of tests, internal assignments, seminars, terminal exams and practical. The evaluation tests the cognitive skills of the students. Some of the reforms implemented by the college are as follows:-

- Assignments/Project-based internal assessment is taken in all PG courses.
- Re-totalling option is provided to the students by the University.
- Revaluation by the University.
- If the candidate is dissatisfied with the revaluation, then there is a provision of providing the Xerox copies of the original answer books on demand.
- If the candidates desires he can go for re-revaluation which is done by a panel of 03 Professors.
- These provisions provide transparency to the evaluation process.
- The introduction of semester system in PG classes from session 2011-12 with CCEs & project work is the important measure adopted by the colleges.

The IQAC cell of the college looks after the implementation of evaluation reforms, if any by university or higher education. However the institution has also initiated certain evaluation reforms like, internal assessment through Monthly tests, internal assignments to evaluate the performance of the students. This continuous monitoring has resulted in the increased number of pass out students in the exams and helping them in achieving awards. There by increasing the GER.

#### 1 Student Assessment:-

The College earnestly follows the stipulated assessment programmes scheduled by the university. In the past few years the pattern of pre-final examination has helped the students to learn time management. This has also familiarized them with the test pattern, and it has also turned out to be a very effective method of revision. Question banks are provided to the students to practice the answering pattern of examination thoroughly. The college follows a system of internal assessment through 4 unit tests and quarterly, half – yearly and pre-final examination annually.

### 2. Gold Medals for students scoring highest marks:-

The Students scoring highest marks in different subjects are motivated by given them Gold Medals in the Annual function. The total of \_\_\_\_ medals are given to induce positive motivation in the students. This practice has positively impacted the results of the institution. In addition 7 awards are also announced from the stage during the Annual Function which are given to the students nominated by the Principal and the Staff Jury for their excellent performance in various categories including the student of the Year Award. This practice has a positive effect on the overall performance of the students.

# 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

To insure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years the college has taken the following initiatives:-

- If grievance persists complaint to semester in-charge.

#### At University level-

- University also has its mechanism for redressal of grievances regarding evaluation in Examinations.
- Aggrieved students will complaint to the Principal.
- Principal will forward the application along with supporting documents to the Registrar of the University.

The college conducts and actively participates in programmes of Social awarenes, adult education, tree plantation, cleanliness programme, blood donation etc. College staff members have also given donations to NGO "WHEELING HAPPINESS" working for physically challenged women. Hemoglobin estimation and Food, Diet and nutrition consultancy is also given by the H.Sc department of the college to the local community. Research aptitude is developed in the students by holding seminars and group discussions and expert lectures regularly in the departments.

### 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Different steps are taken like period wise attendance, informing parents about problems and managing internal misunderstanding between faculty and students. Participation of students C.C.E. is helpful for assessment and efforts are made to increase the pass percentage, regularly. A success rate has been seen since last few years that relate directly to regularity of students and effort done by faculties. Students often get high ranks' in university exam and come in merit list. For some weak students extra classes are arranged.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The college monitors the achievement of learning outcomes through IQAC and Academic Council by:

- Finding out slow and advanced learners and making policies to improve their learning outcomes.
- Conducting class tests.
- Holding class-room discussions.

- Emphasis on written assignments.
- Feedback from alumni.

Yes, there is full autonomy to the principal investigator. They can access to all available resources in the college.

The college actively supports in conducting research projects. The college has limited infrastructure, but human resources are adequate and they actively participate in various research schemes and projects.

#### \* Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave, etc. to teachers.

The faculty members have availed study leave in the past and a few have been motivated to avail the same so as to complete their doctoral and post doctoral researches in time. The college provides duty leave to the faculty to present research papers in the seminars and conferences.

#### \* Support in terms of technology and information needs.

All the departments have computers with internet connectivity. College has well equipped computer laboratory facilities. Also Wi-Fi connection is available for students and staff so that they can use their mobiles, i-pads and laptops for study and research.

### \* Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities

The college facilitates in auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding agencies.

#### \* Any other

Most of the teaching staff is pursuing publication activities of research papers in reputed national and international journals. As a consequence more than hundred research articles have been published /presented in journals, seminars and conferences of national and international levels from faculty members in past 4 years. If we count all the papers during service, it is very high.

However, the faculty can attend seminars and workshops of other universities under the existing UGC rules. Special leave is given to the faculty for attending workshops, seminars and conferences.

Dr. G.P. Ratre, Asst. Prof. Sociology has availed study leave for 1 year 1 month 25days for doing his Ph.D. in his subject. The leave is granted by the State Govt. of C.G.

To create awareness among the society the research findings are circulated to unaware students through classroom teaching. It is also shared and discussed among the peers at the institute and elsewhere. We present our research findings at the national and international platform through conferences and journals of repute. The college also conducts research workshops and seminars (state & national levels) to motivate the students and faculty to indulge in research. A faculty member of the institution is the Members of Editorial board of an 1 research journal 'Research Expression. Another faculty member is a columnist in the periodical "THE TRIO", Rajnandgaon. All the faculty members participate in the seminars of other colleges and share their work experiences with students and other members. Research papers are also published in souvenirs and journals.

As such college does not have any direct fund for research but indirectly provide equipments, laboratory and library facilities to all faculty members. The entire research project is funded by UGC / CGCOST to the individual professor/ Assistant professor w ho apply to the UGC for major/minor research project. College being a govt. institute has no separate budget for research.

## **3.2.2** Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

There is no provision for seed money however, the basic infrastructural facilities including working space, equipment, library, office and laboratory, telephone, internet, water and electricity are provided by the institution. The college also provides necessary man power as and when required. Infrastructural support in terms of library, laboratory facilities including equipment, office and laboratory space, telephone, internet, water and electricity is provided. Although the auditing and submission of utilization n certificates is regarded as the sole responsibility of the principal investigator, the college assists all the purchases through institutional purchase committee and the timely auditing and submission of utilization provides are also monitored through the Research Promotion Cell. But the institution provides

special leave to present research papers at seminars and conferences. The faculty is motivated to carry out the research work at their convenience along with official assignments. In addition, faculty is permitted to avail the special leave as per their entitlement.

### **3.2.3** What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

There is no such provision from the state government at present, but the college but the research committee has decided to provide Research Facilities to the PG students.

Interdisciplinary seminars are attended by faculty members and they participate with their research papers.

The institute makes every effort to ensure optimal use of its resources, be it laboratory or library. In laboratories each student gets opportunity to conduct practical work at least twice in a week. The library has 2 computers available for research scholars with free internet access through Wi-Fi. We have been supported and provided additional grant by UGC under the 11<sup>th</sup> to purchase the equipment for our students. Now student of UG/PG classes have various equipments in different departments for their practical work. Institute ensures optimal use of equipment by forming committee to supervise & ensure the appropriate use of equipment purchased by the institute.

The college has research facilities catering to the needs of researchers. In terms

of research, the college has the following features -

- Well Experienced Faculty
- Rich library with availability of journals

- Well-equipped Laboratories with almost all of the instrumentation needed for

modern scientific research.

• The facilities available in the research centers are availed by the scholars from

other institutions, similarly our scholars are also using research facilities of other institutions as and when needed.

In the college at UG and PG level academic curriculum does not carry research component. However the institution has developed research environment. Many faculty members are pursuing Research Projects. The institute has following research oriented infrastructural facilities:-

- Well equipped laboratories.
- Well developed e-library.
- Internet connectivity is in all the departments.

We upgrade and create our infrastructural facilities from funds received from UGC to buy new technological equipments to facilitate researchers in the new and emerging areas of the research. We have the funds from UGC to purchase the equipments.

Research promotion cell of the college, in coordination with the heads of departments, plan for up-gradation and creation of infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers, following which, sincere efforts are made towards their implementation. Some of the recent achievements are as follows:

- Almost all the departments have computers with internet facility and the college campus has Wi-Fi internet connectivity for students and faculty. Many head of the departments have been provided with laptops.
- Maintenance and up-gradation of instruments and libraries.
- The college has well-equipped laboratories for research work with almost all the instruments needed for modern scientific research are available.

Many consultancy services have been provided by the college keeping in view the nutritional, medical, socio-economic upliftment of the society and environmental issues. The college motivates the faculty to utilize their expertise for the advantage of society by preparing appropriate protocols for the best possible free consultancy services which can be imparted with available facilities and manpower. Psychological counselling by the Psychology Department and educating the common man with polling rights to encourage them to cast their votes by the NSS/NCC units in collaboration with the State Election Commission. As per rules paid consultancy is not allowed. Departments of Home-science support consultancy services for the upliftment of socio-economically deprived sections of society. Social lacunae and community based needs are kept in view while taking decision on organizing and implementing consultancy services. A faculty of Psychology Department also provides district level Consultancy and Counselling to police Mahila Prakosht and Mahila Avam Bal Vakas for family disputes since last 4 years.

### **3.5.3** How does the institution encourage the staff to utilize their expertise and available facilities for consultancy services?

Academic expertise of individual faculty members is publicized through the college web site and prospectus for accessibility to outsiders. Based on the expertise and experience of the faculty members in different areas, the authorities depute/ recommend them as resource persons / subject experts. Administrative offices, Autonomous cell, departments of Psychology have offered their consultancy services to various institutions. Some of the major services undertaken are:

- Study of Socio Psychological Health of Salwa Judam Children of Chhattisgarh have been completed.

The institute makes every effort to encourage the staff to provide guidance to the student. The faculty members are visiting other institutes and transferring their expertise. The college motivates the faculty to utilize their expertise for the advantage of society by preparing appropriate protocols for the best possible consultancy services which can be imparted with available facilities and manpower. Need based consultancy services are also provided by the college and educating the common man with polling rights to encourage them to cast their votes(SVEEP) by the social wing of NSS /NCC units in collaboration with the District Administration.

The broad areas of consultancy services consists of nutritional, medical, socioeconomic needs of the society. Normally speaking, all endeavours of consultancy are made without any motive of generating income. Consultancy provided by the as member of Woman & Child Development H.O.D Psychology department advisory committee, nominated by District Collector RAJNANDGAON. She is also a nominated member Police Mahila Prakosht of Rajnandgaon. Our Principal is the principle member of Academic Staff college, Pdt. Ravishankar Shukia University, Raipur. He is also VC Nominee for the appointment Asst. Proff. and Principal under Satutory~28.and Govt. Nominee of Govt. of Chhatisgarh Shashi Nikay for Govt. Digvijay Autonomous College, Rajnandgaon. Being a Govt, college, it offers these services on non-remunerative basis with the resources available for them. Each faculty member of the institution gives consultancy to students on various issues like- Academic, social, Research etc. s.

## 3.5.5 What is the policy of the institution in sharing the income generated through consultancy (staff involved: Institution) and its use for institutional development?

As mentioned above, no revenue is generated through consultancy service. In this

institution, all endeavors of consultancy are made without any motive of generating income. - Induction into, and continuance of Higher Education is specifically stressed for girls.
- Girls especially from deprived/marginalized section are encouraged to take benefit of various financial support schemes of the Govt.
- Students are advised to follow practices like; Yoga, Surya Namaskar, Meditation etc, for their holistic development.
- IQAC motivates students to various objectives of community. Ex. Community Policing, Help in maintaining Law & Order with district administration, pursuing people for Roof Water Harvesting, polethene Free Atmosphere, etc.

## 3.6.5 How does the institution promote the participation of students and faculty in extension activities including participation in NSS, NCC, YRC and other National/ International agencies?

### 4.1 Physical Facilities

### **4.1.1** What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

Constant efforts are made to get the latest infrastructure facilities from all kinds of resources like MHRD, UGC/State government and other agencies. A multi-purpose sports complex. A new Block of 14 spacious classes are under construction. There are two hostels providing accommodation to girls and a third one under construction with grant of received from UGC, a well-equipped auditorium is near completion with 100 seating capacity, a library with reading room and Wi-Fi facility. All civil works are undertaken by building committee with the help of public works department (PWD) of state government. These coordinate between various departmental requirements and government departments like CSEB, PWD and TELECOM etc.

Multi-purpose gymnasium and sports infrastructure.

• Coaching of different games and skill development through advanced equipments and training kits.

• Multipurpose sports complex is under construction, for which the grant of Rs. 1.4 crore is sanctioned by the state government.

• One Tribal Post Metric Hostel in the premises accommodating 100 students. 52 seater hostel from UGC grant is not functional as we have not received posting from Govt. of CG. Moreover 100 beded hostel withdrawn from Govt. of CG is under construction.

Our building construction is also initiated and we hope we will get new building up to the end of 2016. So we are planning for well equipped laboratory and library.

For creation and enhancement of infrastructure to facilitate effective teaching and learning the college has proposed a plan worth Rs. 21 Crore for infrastructural support in forth coming years through RUSA (Rastriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan). For implementation of govt. policies to provide quality education for continuously increasing student strength our policy is to maintain excellent infrastructure and resources in the institution. Our college is continuously working to maintain its status according to the norms and standards of higher education and quality education. As per requirement institution demand funds from govt. and UGC for development of infrastructure. To facilitate effective teaching learning process institution new building is under construction with 14 class rooms and as per the requirement of increasing student strength the construction of first floor of Botany Lab is completed & it will added to our infrastructure. Institution provides support to increase infrastructure & facilitates effective teaching & learning through Janbhagidari funds & A/F funds received from the students. Govt. Kamla Devi Rathi Girls college has a well managed 12.79 acre campus area protected by a boundary wall.

### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for

### A. Curricular and co-curricular activities-

The infrastructural facilities available with the institution are as below:

 $\Box$  The college area is divided into sections which includes two major buildings surrounding a courtyard, an Auditorium near completion, a Conference Hall, A Multi-Purpose Sports Hall, Classrooms, Hostel building and one under construction, Laboratories, Principal chamber, Staff room, Admin office, A Library, Badminton Hall, Store Room, NSS room, Placement cell, IQAC and a triangular garden, College has a Canteen for students and staff, another big building sponsored by RUSA is under construction.

**Classrooms:** College has 12 classrooms in which there is a proper light arrangement, ventilation for natural light and air. Sitting arrangement with proper visibility for both students and faculty members and furniture is sufficient according to the strength. Some of our classrooms are equipped with audio visual facility.

**Seminar Hall**: "Rabindra NathTagore Seminar Hall1 is a multipurpose Hall which can accommodate about 100 persons, which is regularly used for various activities.

**Auditorium:** "Sabha Grah" is a huge auditorium constructed by Nagar Nigam, Rajnandgaon, C.G. with a capacity of almost 500 persons is near completion. It has a stage, a green room and a balcony in it where various functions and campaigns can be organized.

### **Technology enabled learning space**:

The college has a special ICT classrooms, Wi-Fi connectivity and internet connections. There is a computer facility in the library as well as in all the departments. The ratio of computer to student is 1:170.

**Laboratories**: The college has 7 well equipped labs for regular students for basic subjects – Physics, Chemistry, Zoology, Botany and Micro-Biology, Geography and Psychology.

### Specialized facilities and equipment for teaching and learning:

□ LCD projectors, 3 photo-copier, 1 Over Head Projectors, 2 Laptop, 20 computers.

**Botanical Garden**: A well defined botanical garden is maintained by the Botany Deptt. which has many species/families of plants as per the required syllabus.

### Specialized facilities & equipment for Teaching, Learning & Research-

Each department of the Institution has its own separate laboratories, libraries and computers which can be used by the students for their project works and for the staff for their research projects.

**Canteen**: "Kamala Cafeteria" is in the premises to fulfill the required refreshment for staff and students.

In addition to above mentioned facilities our college has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the student, staff and other members. We have **Three Water coolers with purifiers** for drinking water, at three different locations. We have such a huge building, campus and sprawling grounds which is always used by the District Administration for various kinds of elections as Parliamentary, Assembly, Local Bodies and we even have four voting booths of ECI in the premises. College is made centre for various VYAPAM and CGPSC exams.

**NSS/NCC room**: College has one unit of 100 students in NSS and 53 students in NCC. NSS as per its motto works for society at large making students a responsible citizen and NCC follows the motto of 'Unity and Discipline'.

**Career guidance Cell**: There is a separate room for skill development and placement cell. This cell works regularly for skill development and enhancement of student's personality by organizing lectures on various career options by experts from different fields.

**Cultural Activities**: Every year annual function is organized by the college. The students of the college participate very actively at district and university levels. Along with this various cultural and literary competitions are also organized with the help of various SOCIETIES running in college: Red Ribbon Society, Cultural and Literary Society.

**Recreational facilities**: Outdoor and indoor sports and games facilities, sufficient number of magazines, with reading room facility are available for recreation. There is a girl's common room with television facility.

**Facilities for medical emergencies**: Being govt. Institution the medical services of district hospital and ambulance is always available if required. There is a first-aid box available in the Sports and NCC/NSS and Home-science Department.

**Security**: Being an only girls college, a separate security support is provided by the local police authorities, so that there is no security threat from outsiders.

**Constant Supply of Safe drinking Water**: With two submersible pumps for two tubewells we have two sump wells and four overhead storage tanks.

### B. Extra Curricular activities:-

There are various sports grounds built within the college campus because of which students perform better in sports activities. We have facility for Indoor Games and outdoor sports. A separate sports department with a multipurpose sports hall is managed by competent sports officer. College has been participating in various inter university, University level tournaments.

During the session 2015-16 we have received grant of Rs. 1,40,00000 for Building Construction from RUSA, Rs. 1 Crore from State Govt. and Rs. 2,65,00000 for 100 Beded Women-Hostel.

### **4.4.2** What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

For maintenance and upkeep of infrastructure facilities, and equipment of the college, proposals invited and budget allotted either from UGC grant or from Janbhagidhari –

The major portion of the maintenance is done by the PWD (Building and Electricity). Minor repairing work is done by private agencies through self-financing and Janbhagidari Samiti funds. Repairing/maintenance/service of equipment is done on call basis/AMC basis whenever there is a breakdown. The sensitive equipments are maintained through annual maintenance contract. Photo-copier machine, examination software, fax machine, student software, admission software, hostel software, water cooler, water purifiers and batteries are under AMC.

- College has two submersible pumps which ensure constant supply of water. There are six overhead tanks too. In case of emergency Municipal Corporation provides water tankers. To improve the water level, water harvesting technique is used .
- Multipurpose sports complex is constructed for which a grant of Rs. 7200000 has been received from U.C. It is going to be one of the biggest multipurpose sports complex in the region.

Yes. We carry out the precision and calibration from time to time Annually & whenever the need arises.

The college offers a number of scholarships to the students and it is ensure that the financial id is distributed on time.


College provides various scholarships and freeships to the students as follows:

Our college publishes the annual magazine SWAMPRABHA, in which students participate and contribute their articles.

## 5.1.5 Describe the efforts made by the institution to facilitate entrepreneurial skills, among the students and the impact of the efforts.

The Career and counseling cell regularly holds workshops and seminars where resource persons illustrate various ways of developing entrepreneurship. The College has arranged two entrepreneurship awareness camps of three days each (09.01.12 to 11.01.12 and 15.01.14 to 17.01.14) organized by Entrepreneur Cell. The number of students who participated in these camps were 75. As a consequence of these camps a good number of the students have found their way to self employment and business. Thus being gainfully engaged, they have become productive members of society. Regular trainings are organized through the carrier guidance cell. Students are also given training for Beauty Parlor, Food Preservation, Mehend and Rangoli, Best of Waste etc. to develop entrepreneur skills.

- Entrepreneurial skills among the students are facilitated by the institution through **Career Guidance Cell & Udyamita Prakosth.** They regularly organize various entrepreneurial skill development programmes according to the needs of the students.
- Newly admitted students are enrolled in guidance cell through registration process. Registration process helps to sort out the areas of interest of the students.
- Programmes like Personality Development, Entrepreneurship Awareness & Skill Development are organized by the college.
- Guest lectures of Experts in Entrepreneurship development are organized for students.
- A separate Entrepreneurship Development cell (Udyamita Prakosth) is also functional in the college, where interested students who would like to start self-employment & entrepreneurship are being counseled by the members of the Udyamita Prakosth.

Students are provided free of cost expert coaching lectures for different types of competitive exams. A number of students are benefitted by these exams. The number of students appeared in such exams, the data is unavailable. Approx. 400-450 students appeared in competitive exams during last 4 yrs and approx. 20-25 students got selected in different competitive exams.

## 5.1.8 What type of counseling services are made available to the students (academic, personal, career, psycho-social etc.)

Yes, the college provides personal enhancement and development schemes for students. The faculties actively participate in various matters related to academic and personal problems. The students have easy access to the following kinds of counseling services:

#### Academic counseling

• The admission committee conducts academic counseling at the time of entry into the college regarding the choice of stream and subjects. The faculty guides the students as and when needed. Academic counseling is given to the students through various seminars, conferences and workshops organized for them.

• Orientation programme is conducted at the beginning of each session.

#### **Personal Counseling:**

• Personal counseling is provided to the students through the Women Councelling Cell on any issue concerning their welfare. The faculty members are available to counsel the students.

#### **Career Counseling:**

• Career counseling is given by the Career Guidance and Counseling Cell. In this regard, Expert Lectures on Career Options was organized in 2015 and a fifteen days training programme of Spoken English was organized in 2014 and 2015.

#### **Psycho-Social Counseling:**

• Three helpline numbers are provided to cater to the psycho-social needs of students. The departments of Sociology and Psychology look after these numbers. The Counseling Clinic or Center has proved as a great blessing for students suffering from different kinds of disorders. The college invites resource persons from various fields for professional as well as psychological counseling of the students.

#### 5.1.9 Does the institution have a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of

Although the institutions does not have a structural mechanism for career guidance and placement of its student, however the following services are provided by the cell to help students identify job opportunities and prepare them for the interviews:-

- There is a regular internship programme included in the U.G. and P.G. courses which help the students.
- Personality development training programmes are being organized by the cell at regular intervals.
- There is a career library in the cell consist of various competitive books.
- Internet facility is available in cell to provide information and application for different competitive exams.
- Specific classes are being conducted by the experts of various fields to guide the students in right direction.
- To improve the communication skill among the students, training programmes and classes are organized by the cell.
- Career cell organizes various Job oriented workshops and seminars throughout the year to give an exposure to the students towards the Job opportunities.
- Students are motivated to participate in Job fairs, competitions and interviews organized by Nodal college, Jila Panchayat and other institutions.
- Students passed out from different departments (subjects) of the Institution are placed in various fields of Employment, near Satna town.
- There are no campus interviews or campus selection by any company or employer so far.
- Counselling regarding the choice of stream/ subjects.
- To identify job opportunities.
- To prepare for interviews and group discussions.
- To trainfor various needs of the industry. Classes for food preservation, fine arts, cooking and baking, jewellery designing etc. are run by the department of Home Science.
- Programmes like Personality Development and Communication Skills are also organized.
- Seminars and training programmes are organized for disseminating information among the students and counsel them regarding career options.
- In library, there is a corner where general knowledge and various competition books are available.
- Spoken English classes and Career Option Lectures were conducted.
- Students can avail internet and computer facility in the college premises.

### 5.1.10 Does the institution have a student grievance redressal cell? If yes, list (if any) the grievances reported and redressed during the last four years.

Yes, we have the student Grievance and Redressal cell and Anti-Ragging Cell. In this cell police officers and students take part in monthly meeting. We are pleased to announce that we don't have any complaint related with student grievances. We have provided a box for complaint and each week we open it and solve the problems. Very few cases have been reported during the last four years. All these grievances are related with the stealing habit in the students since they come from the low profile, backward and poor classes.

## 5.1.11 What are the institutional provisions for resolving issues pertaining to sexual harassment?

We are having Women Counseling and Sexual Harassment Cell or 'Mahila Pratarna Nivaran Prakoshth' to resolve issues pertaining to sexual harassment. Members of this committee remains in contact of girls and get all the information/complaints regarding sexual harassment, so far, no complaint has been brought in our notice regarding this matter. Yes, there is a complaint box which is regularly managed for by the committee of the faculty staff.

## 5.1.12 Is there an anti-ragging committee? How many instances (if any) have been reported during the last four years and what action has been taken on these?

Yes, we have the student anti-ragging cell. In this cell police officers and students take part in monthly meeting. We are pleased to announce that we don't have any complaint related with student ragging. There is an Anti Ragging Committee in the college. The committee meets periodically to examine if any case of ragging has been reported and to ensure that there is a congenial atmosphere between junior and senior students. Yes, the anti ragging committee works with a 'Zero-Concept'. Not even a single case of ragging has been reported during the last four years. Principal regularly monitors the proceedings of this committee and the measures taken for controlling it.

• Institution has its own Corpus Fund or 'Nirdhan Chhatra Sahayata Kosh' (poor student help fund) This is used according to the requirements of students on the priority basis such as for fee deposition (admission & examination both), medical treatment etc.

- A garden around the college building provides healthy and refreshing environment .
- A canteen based on standards of health and hygiene and provides delicious food to the students.
- A cycle stand and parking area are among the basic amenities for the staff and students.
- Some eminent members of the society have also contributed generously to a fund which goes into prize money awards for meritorious students
- Besides these following signages are there :-

  - $\checkmark$  There is a reading space and Research Zone in the library



## 5.2.3 How does the institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education and/or towards employment?

Institution facilitate student progression to higher level of education it organized orientation programme of each faculty- Science, Arts, Commerce, Home Science.

- It also organizes orientation programmes subject- wise where HODs with their faculty members provide detailed knowledge of the scope and job opportunities in their particular subject.
- Institution organizes Mental Ability test, Aptitude test, Interest test for VI semester students of all faculty so that they can come to know and clearly decide their field of interest for higher studies.
- For giving more knowledge of the subject, institute provides many reference books related to the subject through departmental library/ E-library, which helps them to decide subject for their higher studies.
- For P.G. students special counseling is done student wise by the HOD and faculty members of each subject to help them to choose topics for M.Phil /Ph.D. Besides this institution also organizes guest lectures and speeches from different subject personalities to guide the student for Ph.D/ M.Phil.
- For facilitation towards employment institution has constituted a career guidance cell, which organizes many programmes for entrepreneurships and job employment promotion.

## 5.2.4 Enumerate the special support provided to students who are at risk of failure and drop out?

- We organize extra classes for weaker students, who are at the risk of failure.
- Remedial coaching is provided under UGC scheme.
- Faculty members provide their own books to students for their studies.
- Yes the drop out of students is the major issue related with the students, because our college stakeholders are from backward areas. We organize the meetings with parents to provide positive environment for learning at home also, because our major stakeholders are belonging to deprived class and many times they show orthodox nature. It reduces the risk

of drop out. We are getting better response from parents and even after marriage in-laws are sending the girls for higher education.

• We identify the students at risk of failure and drop out, then proper guidance and help is provided by the college for continuity of the education.

#### 5.3 Student Participation and Activities

## 5.3.1 List the range of sports, games, cultural and other extracurricular activities available to students. Provide details of participation and program calendar.

Students participate in sports, games, cultural and extra- curricular activities organized by college at different level and other colleges of the state. These activities are organized at various levels such as college level, District level, State level and Inter University level.

**Sports Activities**: - Sports activities are organized according to the sports calendar issued by Higher education Department and Govt. of C.G.. Institute provides facilities for Indoor, Outdoor Games and Sports. Since a separate Sports Multipurpose complex and a Gymnasium is available in the premises the Girls get ample opportunity for their practice. Indoor activities like Chess, Table tennis, Carom and ball, Outdoor Activities like Kabbadi, Basket ball Hand ball, Volley ball, Athletics ,Badminton and Kho-kho are regularly organized. Girls are given regular practice sessions by Sport officers and experts time to time. Institution also organizes Judo and Karate enabling students to gain confidence in self defense.

Activities-There are 22 various activities which cover all three fields- Cultural, Literary and Artistic ,like Clay modeling, Spot painting, Rangoli , Cartooning ,Collage ,Poster making , Speech , Debate , Quiz, Mimicry, Solo song Classical ,Group Song Folk, Classical Solo dance. Group Folk dance, One-act Play, Instrumental cushion, Western Solo Song, Western Group Song is organized at different levels by the college. These Cultural and Literary activities encourages students to express their talents in various fields and help them to develop a confident multi dimensional personality.

**Cultural Activities-** Annual function is organized every year and students take part with group song, group dance, solo song, solo dance, drama, general knowledge competition and various other literary activities.

**5.3.3** How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers, to improve the performance and quality of the institutional provisions?

Institution gets the feedback from employee by the orders issued for them from time to time. For implementation of the order Principal Calls a meeting and a programme is planned according to the work. Different committees are formed for implementation of the plan. The process of implementation and execution is continuously monitored by the Principal. In this way institution continuously work to improve the performance. Institution seek the feedback from graduates by :

- i. Organizing parents meeting
- ii. Orientation Programme
- iii. Complaint/Suggestion Box
- iv. Personal Interaction with students- By HOD, Faculty members & Principal
- v. Random checking done by Principal.

After getting the academic feedback Principal meets with the concerning subjects' HODs and teachers and give required suggestions. Principal has formed different committees for regular monitoring of facilities like water, furniture, vehicle parking, library, cleanliness in the campus. Feed back is taken from every final year students at the end of session suggestions and aspiration are accordingly conveyed to staff in the staff council meetings on important occasions. The college has a systematic feedback system in which feedback is taken from students in the prescribed format. Oral feedback is also taken from the students by the principal. The principal also takes feedback from the parents .Feedback is also taken by the alumni in the alumni meet. Points stressed in the feedback are improved and strengthened accordingly. In this way feedback is used as a basis for quality enhancement in the education. Institution takes regular feedback from students, teaching and non-teaching staff. Then IQAC cell analyze the feedback for improving the performance of teachers and office employers. Best feedback is received then it is assumed as ideal feedback and encouraged to others also for follow the practices.

We try to publish the student magazine regularly, but sometimes funding problem is created. In library we have the wall magazine facility, through which students can express their thoughts. As result several students come out with writings involving all generes like poetry, story etc. The college magazine —SWAMPRABHA is published

annually and SWARNANJALI published in the year 2013-14 to commemorate the Golden Jubilee, was brought out with much enthusiasm with contributions from alumni's also.

As per the norms of department of higher education Govt. of C.G., student council is elected, but for two years, i.e. session 2012 -13 and2013-14 there was no election and consequently there was no elected council. Although a temporary council was formed by selecting toppers of the classes. In the students council/union members are nominated from amongst the meritorious students from all the classes of the college by the Principal and nomination committee. The rules and regulations and procedure of functioning of the council is carried out in accordance with direction from the chancellor's office. The Election process recommenced again in the session 2014-15 and Student Union is formed as per ordinance issued by Higher Education Department for the respective academic session. Student Union consists of student council which includes President, Vice President, Secretary, Joint Secretary, Class Representative and Activities Committees which includes Cultural Society, Social Work Society, Science Club, Sports Society and Society on Gender issues. The main source of funding for student council is from amalgamated fund & sports fund. There is a provision of constituting a student's council on set principles laid down by higher education.

## 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?



## 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If 'yes', indicate the levels of participative management.





#### 6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

The persons involved in administration of the college are deficit in numbers so they are given duty of two or more departments. The faculty has been provided with separate staffroom and almirahs. Science faculty are having their labs with equipment and modern technologies.



The organizational structure of the institution is as under:-

The Principal is the head of the institution and the different departments are headed by the HOD's. There are Professors and Assistant professors in different departments. In addition to the teaching departments there is a librarian in the library and a sports officer. The office staff is there for the smooth functioning of official jobs. Lab technicians and attendants are there in the science departments. There are peons and also a sweeper. There are various committee for the conduction of various activities like admission committee, anti ragging committee, cultural committee, literary committee etc. The committee take decisions regarding various activities but the final authority is the principal. Departmental decisions are taken by the H.O.D by mutual consent of the faculty members but final stamping is done by the principal. In this way there is a decentralized system of leadership

headed and guided by the principal. It being a govt. college, the *Principal* has all powers of decision taking & financial powers the *Principal* however forms different committees and deligates the powers to the Conveners. The final decision rests with principal, although Janbhagidari samittee also helps the principal in taking certain decisions. IQAC also extend full cooperation to Principal in the same.

#### **Teaching and Learning:**

- The quality in teaching and learning begins with the admission process itself as there is a Guidance and Counselling Committee to provide a helping hand to the new entrants.
- Departmental meetings are regularly held for monitoring quality in teaching and learning.
- Academic calendar is strictly followed.
- A number of Skill Development programs have been introduced to help the students prepare for job market.
- ICT teaching and learning aids help in improving the overall standard of quality learning. To keep pace with the modern day teaching methodologies, latest teaching methods using computers, Wi-Fi campus, interactive boards, LCD projector are increasingly employed in the classrooms.
- Field visits, excursions tours, guest lectures, introduction with higher learner models, graphs, charts, interactive sessions are encouraged.
- Group discussions, seminar, Power-Point presentations are prepared by the different departments and presentation by the students is also encouraged.
- Library has a number of books, journals and magazines for knowledge up gradation.

#### **Research and Development:**

- The Research Promotion Cell is formed to assist and promote research activities in the college.
- Faculty members are encouraged and motivated to take up research projects.
- Faculty members are encouraged to organize and attend seminars, conferences and workshops.
- Publication of research papers in reputed journals by faculty members is encouraged.
- A new book, journals and reference material is added every year.

• Students are also motivated to participate in research activities through paper presentation in seminars and conferences.

#### **Community Engagement:**

- Community orientation is a fundamental principle closely followed by the institution. Programmes like field visits, organising road safety awareness camps and blood donation campaigns are a few of the activities of NCC and NSS. A survey on the problems of drop-out rate of school going childrens has been made.
- The institution arranges parent-teacher meet in every session so as to ensure their active participation in studies.
- Alumni meets are also arranged to take inputs from the alumni members.
- To promote awareness and moral enrichment of the students, programmes related to social responsibilities and citizenship awareness ie., discussion for voters ship, human rights, female foeticide are organized. The department of Sanskrit organised "Sanskrit Diwas" in 2015.
- Counseling by Counseling Clinic of Psychology Department were tested for GNI (Guidance Need Inventory Test) by Psychology department.

#### Human Resource Planning and Development:

- Creating leaders by delegation of duties and authority.
- Implementing systems for administration and academics.
- Teaching faculty is recruited by the government and most of them are Ph.D.
- The faculty members and students are encouraged to attend National and International seminars /symposium /conferences /workshops. Faculty is also motivated to organize such activities.
- The institution works to make students qualified and committed citizen.
- The institution has Career Counselling and Guidance cell, which organizes Expert Lectures on "Career Options".
- Various extracurricular activities, Fruit preservation, Aerobics and fitness, Self defence,
- beautician course, etc. are organized.
- One of the major concerns of this institution is the overall development of students, i.e. organizing national seminars in different subjects related to society and ensuring maximum participation of students.
- Guest lecturers of eminent speakers are arranged.
- As per the rules, every year, a self-appraisal report is furnished by the faculty members. It is ensured that classes are conducted daily on time. At regular intervals, meetings of all the heads of the departments are taken to ensure the internal quality checks.
- The college office s taff has also undergone computer oriented training programmes.

#### **Industry Interaction:**

• The institute interacts with various local industries and organizations. The college consults on various issues for the improvement of education system and development of employable skills and job oriented programmes.

- Fifteen days training program for students in collaboration with food processing department,

- Students are taken to Energy Park to introduce new alternate energy resources and enteract with people working there

The college is a government institution in which all approved proposals are implemented. The important decision regarding the syllabus of semester system and CCE is taken by the government last year. Now there is one paper of each subject. CCE is also taken once in one semester. The Principal, in-charge semester cell and in-charge CCE, monitor the system successfully. Admission process is also changed by the government. Now admission will be done online in the forthcoming academic session. The Principal of the college has formed admission and verification committees to run the work smoothly and successfully. Orientation & Training programmes were also organized to make the people familiar with the new process of admission which was done successfully. Audio Visual aids were used to make the teaching system advance. Many decisions of women security and exploitation were taken. To provide security and protection to the women CCTV camera is operative in the college and it is connected with Principals office. Thus eve teasing is totally controlled and checked.

The affiliating university does make provision for according the status of autonomy to its affiliated institutions. We have not sincerely tried for such a status in the past as the college does not fulfill the norm required for autonomy. It is an affiliated college of Pdt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur.

The college has a Grievance and Redressal Cell, Women Cell and Sexual Harassment cell to attend to any complaint or suggestion. Students have easy access to staff members, heads and principal for one to one interaction. Suggestions or complaints are welcomed from parents through parent- teacher meeting and through the alumni. By doing so each staff comes to know what is happening in each department and they become capable of working in other departments.

The strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment are in accordance with the central & state govt. rules. - The institution is flexible in allowing the faculty members to attend orientation/ refresher courses for the enrichment of their academic criteria.
- Teachers are encouraged to attend the National and International conferences.

- The quality faculties are retained by giving some authorization to take decisions in certain matters and to involve their active participation in institutional activity.
- Efforts are made to satisfy their intellectual urge which consequently creates a best possible ambience.

### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

# 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The financial resources of the college are managed in a very effective, transparent and foolproof manner. There is an accountant in the office staff, who has full facility of computer system to maintain the accounts of the college. The following three types of accounts are created.

- Receipt and Payment Account
- Income and Expenditure Account
- Balance Sheet
- Daily fee collection register
- Cashbook

Each and every transaction is supported by vouchers. All the collections are deposited in the bank and all the expenditure recurring or non recurring are incurred through cheques. Only duly authorized persons can operate through the bank. For effective checks on the accounts internal and external audit is done perpetually. The internal audit committee consists of Convener and members of staff and office Head Clerk.. The external audit is done by a chartered accountant before the session comes to an end and Government audit is also conducted from time to time.. In the institute for efficient use of the financial resources a budget is prepared and according to need of various departments, the money is distributed. There are three types of expenditure and payments, recurring, non-recurring and capital expenditure.

# 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The internal audit is done by a committee formed by the head of the institution where as external audit is done by departmental auditor and A.G.C.G. Raipur. The Janbhagidari Samiti finances are audited by a Chartered Accountant appointed by the Janbhagidari Samiti before 31st March each year. If any objection is made by the audit team then the same is compiled in totality before the next claims are submitted. The last external audit was conducted in March 2012 by A.G.C.G Raipur. There were a few objections in the institute, finances by the audit party which were related with some small discrepancies. These objections were removed immediately at present all accounts are clear.

# 6.4.3 What are the major sources of institutional receipts/funding and how is the deficit managed? Provide audited income and expenditure statement of academic and administrative activities of the previous four years and the reserve fund/corpus available with Institutions, if any.

There is a budget of every fund the amount to be spent in a financial year the concerning stakeholder's does accordingly. Major funding is Tution fee from UGC, janbhagidari fee from students, sports; cultural etc. is waived off by higher education deptt. And the deficit is borne by state govt.

The institution is affiliated to Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (Chhattisgarh). The university has its set mechanism to audit the academic working of the colleges. The university sends a team of the experts to conduct academic audit. The team visits the college and very minutely observes the working of the institution in all its aspects. The team then comments on the performance and thereby suggests the important changes required. Internal assessment committee also suggests the changes desirable in the college. The College very honestly adheres to the recommendations made by the committees. Students are the best judges to give their feedback about the academic delivery. Periodically, they are allowed to speak out their problems, including their academic growth. This tells where exactly they are and what can be done for their improvement and betterment.

# 6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

There is a mechanism for internal and external audit. The details are as follows:

- Institutional account committee is formed for verification of cash books and internal audit. The external audit is done by auditors from the Accounted General, Govt. /departmental auditors and Chartered Accountant. The audit is also done by the Departmental auditors. In general, audit is carried out at the end of each financial year in case of routine annual allotment and in case of scheme allotment; audit is done at the completion of scheme.
- An e-record of relevant (Salary) data is maintained.
- Audit of non-government financial accounts like autonomous account, Self- Finance account and Janbhagidari account is carried out by hiring a Chartered accountant. Govt. audit has been done till 2012 and all non Govt. funds, , U.G.C., self- finance, Janbhagidari samiti fund t accounts are audited till 2012.

College strictly follows & implement orders released by Higher Education in respect to Academic quality assurance i.e. attendance, maintenance of Teaching Diaries, Time-Table & academic calendar. Conducting internal academic audit IQAC, Institution tries to fulfill the criteria for quality assurance set by the regulatory authority i.e. Department of Higher Education, C.G.

# 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

# **Structure:**

- Institution has a set programme to review the teaching learning process through IQAC.
- Apart from this a regular feedback by students, parents, teaching-staff and Heads of depts. are welcomed by the Principal.
- Principal keeps a check on the day-today teaching through weekly and monthly planners of the various departments.
- Personal interaction with the students is a great help in reviewing the learning process. Any problem with the teaching methodology or with the unavailability of the facilities is being brought into the notice of the Principal immediately.

# Methodology of operation:

The teaching-learning process is being reviewed at different levels by various people such as-**Principal** holds meeting with the Heads of departments to discuss the Academic plan of the whole year in accordance with the Academic calendar provided by the Higher education, C.G.

**HODs** maintain and check all the records of the attendance and teaching plan of the teachers and guide them from time to time. They also interact personally with the students.

**Office staff** keeps a record of the attendance of the Teaching faculty and inform the Principal if there is any irregularity since it affects the learning process.

**Professors and Asst. Professors** teach with full sincerity and keep interacting with students to enforce changes needed related to the time table or teaching style or if any other help is needed by them.

# **Outcome:**

The constant input given by all the concerned people contribute in successful teaching-learning experience. Outcome of continuous reviewing of teaching learning process is wonderful. It helps in many ways:-

- Helps in better understanding of the subjects.
- Overall personality development.
- Develops the leadership quality among the students along with writing and Presentation skills.

- NGO's like VAN-MITRA also organized plantation camp in which Honourable Madame Mrs. BINA SINGH, Patron of Van-Mitra was the chief –guest on the occasion.
- Plantation is encouraged by all departments to increase greenery and reduce carbon emission effects.
- Existing gardens are maintained, renovation of the garden at the entrance was done with financial support from Jan Bhagidari Samiti in the year 2013.
- Conferences on issues related to environment are also organized.
- The College has already begun its endeavors in acquiring the process of green audit.

# 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

We are taking following initiatives to make college eco-friendly

# \* Energy conservation

- Active consideration is given to replace old fans to cut down electricity bills.
- A proposal to replace LPG. For energy conservation we have taken precautions for working in natural light.
- Students take care to off the lights, computers and other electrical appliances, when we are not working.
- Tube lights are replaced with Power Saving CFL and LED bulbs to save electricity.
- The college is strictly declared as a **No Polythene zone**. The staff and students are motivated to use paper and cloth bags.
- Stringent power saving measures are observed by the entire college staff.
- The students are also motivated to use cycles to save fuel.
- Staff members and students are instructed to switch off the light & fans, when they finally leave the room to save electricity.
- Institution is planning to install solar panel in the college campus to save energy.

#### \* Use of renewable energy

- At present we are not using renewable energy.
- However, for Information regarding energy conservation, uses of renewable energy and water harvesting we organized a visit to nearby village Aargaoni where students introduced and educated the villagers regarding Biogas plant, Bio-Fertilizers, and water harvesting.

• The NSS workers and the college professors keep inspiring and spreading an awareness about energy conservation measures amongst the inhabitants of the adopted village and those in its neighborhood.

### Water harvesting

- Water is the precious natural resource, so we create awareness among students to save and conserve water.
- Rain water harvesting plant is fitted in college campus ensuring water supply for the whole year.

### \* Check dam construction

- The campus has four inter-connected submersible pumps.
- Drinking water points of college and hostels are connected with aqua-guards.

# \* Efforts for Carbon neutrality

- The carbon emission of college has been made to negligible by plantation in the campus.
- Most of the students use bicycles.
- We are also running campaign among students for carbon neutrality through lectures.
- We emphasize for carbon neutrality during environmental studies subject.

# \* Plantation

- Saplings of plants are presented to Guests insteadof flower bouquet during various functions and birthday celebrations in order to inculcate care for plants which they will plant when they go home, thereby adding a tree and contributing our bit to save the Earth.
- Institution has developed a Botanical garden in the college campus in which medicinal plants are being cultivated.
- The institution also indulge into plantation work in the college campus during the celebrations of Van- Mahoutsav, Independence day, Republic day, NCC day, NSS day etc.

#### \* Hazardous waste management

- Extra care is taken for the safe disposal of hazardous waste.
- Carcinogenic chemicals used in DNA extraction technique by the department of Botany and Biotechnology is dumped deep into the soil after using it.
- Roof Water Harvesting Plants of the college.

- Sport linkages-Sports Association of India.
  - In the library several activities are introduced among the students to motivate them i.e. question of the day, thought of the day.
  - Internal assessment of the students is carried out as exam pattern. Proper time table is displayed on the notice board. So students feel just like examination environment, which helps the students to remove exam phobia. After evaluation of answer books, returned to students, so they can check their faults and rectify them during main examination.
  - IQAC organize the program to motivate the meritorious students. So from each class and each subject/ paper topper student is selected and award program is organized, where students get certificate and prize. It creates competition among the students for quality enhancement.

# • Administrative Innovation

The Principal, Professor, Asstt. Professor, Librarian, Sports officer, Asstt. Grade II, Asstt. Grade III are continuously engaged in administrative work which is mandatory for smooth functioning of the institution.

- **Grant of Scholarships** Medals and Awards are given to meritorious students scoring highest marks in different subjects.
- **Innovation related to evaluation** Through out the year continuous evaluation of the students is conducted in form of unit test & exams. In this way the students undergo persistent monitoring & evaluation all throughout the year.
- Teaching through projectors
- Personality development training and skill development
- Career guidance programme and counseling.
- Institution, issues ID card for each students and staff member, which has given an identity to each individual that is helpful to them even outside the college.
- Our institution has built sports complex with all the facilities e.g. Gym, Badminton Court, Table Tennis Court and the students are able to utilize these facilities in one campus only since the town is small and they don't get all these under one roof/campus.
- Institution started Orientation programme in 2013 for newly admitted students to give them all the knowledge of the institution's rules, regulation, examination patterns etc.

- Institution also organizes Parents meet so that Parents can give their views and advices as well as they also get acquainted about the institution.
- A centre for counseling of student was established in 2011 as 'Counselling Clinic'' where students discuss their psychological problems/family problems with the counselor and get relief.
- Chhattisgarh State Govt. Social Welfare Board has established councelling centre for 'Vivah Purav Paramarsh Kendra' under Central Govt. Scheme.
- Institution is publishing its own magazine called 'Swemprabha', compilation of creative articles, stories, poems, thoughts, and humour etc by students.
- The display boards in each department, displays latest information regarding respective subjects. Apart from this quotations and information about current affairs are displayed daily on display boards in corridors of college campus.

# 7.3 Best Practices

# **Best Practice: I**

# 1. <u>Title of the Practice</u>: Best of Waste

# 2. <u>Goal</u>:

Education no longer means being a college pass-out or getting degree, its horizons have widened. Education today aims for quality self-reliance and empowerment to develop life skills and personality. The goals of the practice are:

- To introduce girls with art and develop handicraft skills.
- To develop aesthetic sense of the students.
- To teach them skills for self employment.
- To create interest in useful hobbies.
- To creste art pieces and utility items from waste material.

# 3. The Context:

Govt. Kamla Devi Rathi Mahila Mahavidyalaya is the only girl's college in Rajnandgaon District with vision and mission to impart quality education through empowerment, skill enhancement and self reliance. Most of the girls hail from remote, rural/tribal areas with poor socio-economic background and orthodox families. Many of them are first generation learners of the families. Due to the vast difference in their family environment and the world outside their home, they do not have the skills required. They lack family support and finances. This practice of 'Best of Waste' helps them to develop skills at a very low cost and also give them exposure to aesthetic sense.

# 4. <u>Practice:</u>

The matter was discussed with the staff and students and it was decided that all the basic requirements and facilities will be provided by the institution. Although it started as a competition among students and the 'Best of Waste' was given prize. But gradually the students were so motivated that they joined this with great enthusiasm and vigor. Under the guidance of the Entrepreneur Cell and Home Science department, the students prepare Wall Hangings, Dolls and Puppets, Pen Stands, Magazine Holders, Dustbins and other decorative items out of the waste material found in surrounds and at home we normally tend to throw away.

# 5. Evidence of Success:

- In spite of few hurdles in the beginning the practice proved its success which is evident by the fact that number of the student participation is increasing every year.
- Students also come up with new ideas of making products out of waste.
- One whole room is full of these items created by the students which are exhibited for public during the various function held in the college from time to time. This endeavor has been widely appreciated.
- Students enjoy a lot in creating new items.

# 6. Problems Encountered & Resources Required:

- Faculty have to put extra efforts to motivate them, since most of them come from far off places they do not have time to take part in all these activities.
- Resources required are minimal as most of the raw material used is available by collecting the waste from staff, homes and college campus. Other accessories required are purchased by the funds contributed by the staff and students.

# 7. <u>NOTE:</u>

- It created positive environment in the campus.
- It enhances creativity of the students.
- It helps to develop skills for self employment.

# **Best Practice – II**

# 1. <u>Title of the Practice:</u> Shairing of Sports Infrastrucrural Facilities:

# 2. <u>Goal</u>:

The college believes in holistic education for the girls for which there is a need to sensitize them and make them aware of the importance of importance of Yoga, fitness & good health. College has a rich sports infrastructure and it was decided to extend these facilities to the girls or boys of the schools in the city and neighbor-hood areas. For this healthy practice, summer coaching camps are organized by the sports department to share our infrastructural facility and coaching expertise and thereby creating a healthy and fit environment.

# 3. The Context

The college caters primarily to girl students from economically weaker sections and rural backgrounds. It was observed that very often they lacked awareness about health and fitness. They were not aware about the importance of sports as a career option. Keeping this in mind the sports department has devised this practice to inform and spread awareness among the students by organizing summer camps not only for the girls students but also for the school children of Rajnandgaon.

# 4. The Practice

Each year summer camps are organized with the collaboration of SAI (Sports Authority of India) and District Judo Association. Yoga camp was organized for mental health and physical fitne

Archery and Cricket coaching for school students, Judo and karate camps to teach self defense to girls. Through this practice, the infrastructural facilities existing in the college can be shared and utilized by others.

# 5. Evidence of success

There is clear evidence to show a marked improvement in their general well being and personality. It has helped in the Developing personality and physical fitness of students as well as development self confidence. A large no. of poor students of both college and school of Rajnandgaon and nearby town have been trained for Archery and they have participated in Archery up to National level and some of them are also selected for SAI(Sports Authority of India) training centre.

### 6. Problems encountered and resources required

Students have to be motivated to participate in the camps. No expenditure is incurred because the facilities and resources required are already existing in the college.

# 7. Contact Details:

# रैगिंग क्या है ?

#### रैगिंग के अंतर्गत -

कोलाहलपूर्ण अनुषित व्यवहार करना, विद्राना, भद्दे या अशिष्ट आचरण करना, उपद्रवी अनुशासनहीन क्रियाकलापों में संलग्न होना जिससे नए छात्र को गुस्सा, अनावश्यक परेशानी, शारीरिक अथवा मानिसक क्षति हो अथवा उसमें आशंका या भय बढ़ाने वाला हो, अथवा छात्र से ऐसा कार्य करने के लिए कहना, जो छात्र/छात्रा सामान्यतया नहीं कर सकता/सकती और जिससे उसे शर्म या अपमान का अनुभव होता हो अथवा उसके जीवन के लिए खतरा हो।

कर्नाटक शिक्षा अधिनियम, 1983 (कर्नाटक अधिनियम नं. 1995), अनुच्छेद 2 (29) के अनुसार रैगिंग की परिभाषा इस प्रकार है :--

किसी छात्र को मजाक में या किसी प्रकार से ऐसा कार्य करने के लिए कहना, प्रेरित करना या बाध्य करना, जो मानव– मर्यादा के खिलाफ हो या उसके व्यक्तित्व के विपरीत हो या जिससे वह हास्यास्यद हो जाए या डरा – धमकाकर गलत ढंग से रोक कर, गलत ढंग से बंद करके या उसे चोट पहुँचाकर या उसे इस प्रकार की धमकी, गलत अवरोध, गलत ढंग से बंदी बनाने चोट या अनुचित दबाव का भय दिखाकर वैधानिक कार्य करने से मना करना।




